Compiling the Walks Programme by Liz Adams

Compiling the walks programme is a bit like doing a jigsaw puzzle but done twice a year. In January and June, I send out begging emails to leaders asking for walks for the next programme and then wait with bated breath for the returns. Like a jigsaw getting the edges in place first - the months and dates and then fill in the centre the walks as I receive them. It is important to try each month to be walking in different parts of the county which gives members who are not city based, the opportunity not to have to travel too far. The recent rise in the cost of living has made bus friendly walks seem a sensible proposition and car sharing is another alternative to save money on petrol, as well as needing fewer car parking spaces at the start point. Once all the walks are in, usually with some gentle reminders, the process of transferring from completed sheet to the typed programme begins. Not being trained in secretarial skills this takes some time, checking grid references from a master list and having OS maps spread across the floor if a new venue has been suggested to check the start points. The entire programme is then sent to all the leaders to check their entries and if possible, the whole document. It is interesting that different people see different mistakes and not all of them the same. Once the final corrections are made, I print off a copy as my reference and then send it to Clive at Dataprint who does the final setting out so that you receive a new programme for the following six months. Obviously, the programme cannot be made without the sterling efforts of all the leaders who contribute their time and energy in leading the walks and it is an opportunity to thank them here. New leaders are always welcome and if you have a favourite walk then offer it to be enjoyed by all members. New walks are always very welcome, despite the same walk looking different in different season, their popularity wanes so new places to walk adds new views to be enjoyed and new perspectives experienced.

Diversions, etc.

The list of modification orders is now 64 outstanding cases. Of these four are awaiting an order, two are under appeal against refusal to make an order, ten have objections outstanding, five have been confirmed and one case has been closed because the claimed path has been dedicated. Seven cases are awaiting determination. Twelve are being investigated, leaving 23 yet to be started.

There are 34 outstanding diversion cases. Of these two have been confirmed; fourteen have had orders made (seven with objections), and a further seven have been consulted on.

At Coldron Mill near Spelsbury we are objecting to a potential tunnel path which gives an inferior view of the house and omits the north-south path, leaving the path to Charlbury to go round two sides of the triangle. On Noke BR10 we are trying to get a better crossing of the Green Belt Way; the latest consultation includes a possible extension. At Waterstock FP6 the works associated with the diversion include replacement of a nearimpossible stile with a gate. The diversion order for Tadmarton BR12, is to the used line rather than down the steep kink in the original consultation, to which we (and a neighbour) objected. The order for Caversfield FP1 will divert the path to the used line, instead of trying to scale an impassable

MoD fence (the houses were originally built for RAF Bicester); works include the repair of a collapsing fence alongside the path.

The stiles on Tetsworth FP65, which I mentioned in the last issue (one is actually on Lewknor FP1) have been repaired, but there is a new fence completely blocking a gate at the farm access on Lewknor FP1.

Work is starting at Warren Crescent; we await the dedication when the work is complete.

Other Matters

Work on the closed paths at Sunningwell FP8 (the quarry) and Marcham BR17 (Marcham Mill bridge) is due to start, but the latter may be held up by legal problems. The path from the A34 bridge at Sunningwell (FP12, part of the Green Belt Way) had been improved. The proposed caravan site at Britchcombe Farm next to the White Horse and the proposed warehouses at Waterstock have attracted strong local opposition.

The operation to remove accumulated silt from the Blenheim Park lakes has caused the paths at the north end of the Queen Pool to be diverted so that the path into Woodstock now leads right in front of Blenheim Palace. The photos show views not normally obtainable without a pass. In my footpath work I often have to get over stiles that wobble like jelly in an earthquake, or were obviously designed for Goliath (but I am only David). It is fortunate that I can still get my knees up to my nose if necessary (see photo, taken while getting over the stile on Tiddington FP6 at the old railway). I will be **80** in February and would like to be able to hand over my

role as Secretary while I can still do so and can still accompany my successor on site visits where necessary. The job also involves compiling the Annual Report. I definitely do not intend to carry on beyond the AGM in 2024.
